

The Wharf

\$3.6B waterfront mixed-use development, supported by a \$198M PILOT/TIF.

Capital One Arena

The \$800M transformation and expansion will be completed by 2027 and is supported by a \$515M investment from the DC government and \$285M contribution from Monumental Sports & Entertainment.

11th Street Bridge Park

DC's first elevated public park will deliver in 2027. The \$92M, 7.3-acre park is supported by \$47M from the DC government.

Union Market

An \$82.4M tax-increment financing (TIF) is supporting public infrastructure improvements & retail parking for this new and expanding mixed-use neighborhood.

St. Elizabeths East

Redevelopment of a historic 180-acre campus, including a new \$434M Cedar Hill Regional Medical Center, CareFirst Arena, residential, and retail uses. Since 2018, the DC government has invested more than \$900M in St. Elizabeths East Campus redevelopment.¹






